Welcome

Run the race which is before you with your eyes focussed on Jesus. That's the encouragement for the readers of the letter to the Hebrews.

Now, many of us might not do much running, but, however we are trying to travel, we know that it is best done by taking the right path for us and looking at where we are going—not on where we once were.

It's true for us as individuals and it's true for the church. As individuals, we are not who we were, but we are still people, lovingly made in the image of God. We still have our calling to be disciples of Jesus. With all God's people we gather with the cloud of witnesses which stretches far back and far ahead of us. As individuals we have changed: so has and so must the church.



Some of us will remember when churches, if not full, were busy lively places, with Sunday school organised and energetic. We can look back longingly or we can run the race which is before us—before us now not in the past—but the only one that allows us to fix our eyes on Jesus.

As we age, our spirit and mind don't seem to age the same: inside we long to be able to do the things we could manage so easily 'back then'. Sometimes when churches gather, we do the same. We long to be what once we were: we don't want to allow our new race to interfere with the one we used to run

The church is not what it once was. That's just the way it is. It is no use looking round for someone or something to blame (any more than anyone is to blame when we age). Every age of the church has unique challenges—we are not unique in being concerned about the future, but if we believe in Christ alive in every age then there remains a calling and there will remain faithful people worshipping God.

To find the race, the proper race, which is before us, to see Christ calling us on we need to discern the path together, through prayer, study, conversation. The way of the past cannot show us the way forward. Fears of the future must not stop us. We must run this race, not someone else's or the one of some other time.

I don't believe that God is done with us, I don't know what is next, but the Spirit does—and together we can listen for her calling.



From Neil Wilson: Memories of Bill

A much loved member of the congregation, Bill died aged 97 on 2 August.

Soon after Anne and I moved to Kendal, Bill impacted on our lives as pastoral secretary, a position he occupied most diligently for many years - we were soon on his radar and it was not long before we joined the walking group which he led with great enthusiasm for years. He had led a similar group in the church he attended in Comrie, Perthshire, before moving here for his second retiral. We couldn't have had a better introduction to the local and wider Cumbrian area. Every walk was thoroughly researched, he and Eleanor having covered the route, sometimes in both directions. These walks, starting by car from the rendezvous in Ford Terrace, were an excellent way to get to know other members of the congregation.

As a fellow Scot and fellow science graduate of Edinburgh University we had much in common. I also knew Comrie well, having lived a few miles away for many years. We shared many theological beliefs resulting in our attending numerous meetings and discussions.

Bill made a significant contribution to music, standing in on many occasions as organist in church and pianist on other occasions. Mildred Burnell remembers that he always played "Brother James' Air" at the gathering of the congregation.

He was a good cook and always produced a cake (usually gingerbread, I think) for the monthly coffee mornings in the Lecture Hall and took the money at the door for a long time.

From Revd Pam Noonan: Bill's story

Born in Dunfermline, the younger of two children, Bill was immensely proud of his Scottish roots.

Following his degree in science at Edinburgh University, he began his career as a food chemist. Being too young to be conscripted he joined the home guard.

He met Elsie his first wife in Bedford and they were married in 1949. They had three children - Neil, Christine and Graham. Sadly, Elsie died prematurely aged 42.

Some years later, Bill met and married Eleanor in 1977. She had two children - David and Paul.

Following his retirement aged 57, they made Cromrie, Perthshire their home, moving to Kendal about 30 years ago to be nearer their families.

They became an important, loyal and valued part of our church family. He was one of the best pastoral secretaries the congregation ever had, and he led the then church walking group. Always available to help others, he was a quiet, determined, independent but fiercely loyal and caring husband, father, grandfather and friend.

We give thanks to God for Bill's life.

Book Group


Dear friends

We have donation points in Asda, Booths and Morrisons.



URC shares nations' grief on the death of Queen Elizabeth II

The United Reformed Church shares in the grief of the nations following the death of Her Majesty the Queen, Elizabeth II.

Following the death of her father King George, Her Majesty succeeded the throne on 6 February 1952, but was officially crowned in 1953. Queen Elizabeth was the world's longest-reigning living monarch and was a much-loved and popular royal figure.

Many United Reformed churches (URCs) have been open for times of prayer and reflection over the days of mourning.



The General Assembly of the URC, the church's governing body, sends a loyal address to the Queen each time it meets. At the 2022 General Assembly, the Assembly wrote to the Queen noting that in this year both Her Majesty and the URC are marking a jubilee.

The Assembly thanked Her Majesty for her "steadfast and faithful service" over the seven decades of her reign.

Praising her example of "duty, integrity and public service", the Assembly placed on record its appreciation of Her Majesty's public witness to her Christian faith and the way in which she has sought to live her life as a servant of Christ.

The Revd Dr John Bradbury, URC General Secretary, said: "Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II lived the most remarkable life of dedicated Christian service.

"As a devout Anglican and Presbyterian her faith shone from her words and deeds. Her contribution to the life of our nations, the Commonwealth, and beyond will be remembered with gratitude for generations to come. She inspired respect from across the political spectrum and from monarchists and republicans alike.

"The United Reformed Church has always been aware that as each General Assembly presents a loyal address to the throne, we have been addressing a fellow baptised sister in Christ. We give thanks for her life and uphold in prayer all who mourn for her. May she rest in peace and rise in glory."

The State Funeral

Did you know someone attended the state funeral on our behalf?

Bishop James is the Bishop of Carlisle: he used to live in Kendal when he was Bishop of Penrith. He is a member of the House of Lords. Another post he has held is Clerk of the Closet to Her Majesty the Queen (annual salary £7 per annum); amongst its many duties he examines any theological books to be presented to the Sovereign, and preaches annually in the Chapel Royal, St James's Palace.

He says "It has been my privilege in recent days to be in London, both for the King's address to Parliament and also to welcome the Queen's coffin in Westminster Hall ahead of its lying-in-state for four days. I had the honour of walking past the coffin on Wednesday afternoon...". And writing about Monday " as the nation comes together for the state funeral, which I will attend on behalf of the Sovereign's Ecclesiastical Household as well as **the churches and people of Cumbria**". Even then Bishop James is not finished "as Her Majesty's coffin makes its final journey to St George's Chapel for a committal service in which it will also be my honour and privilege to take part."
